The Israeli-Iranian Campaign Public Attitudes and Sentiments of the Israeli Public Amid the Iran Conflict

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Methodology and Sample Description

Sample: 1,057 Israeli citizens aged 17–86.

Sampling & Weighting: Weighted for representativeness across gender, age, religion, region, voting behavior, religiosity, and ethnicity (among Jews).

Survey Dates: June 15–16, 2025 (two waves).

Margin of Error: ±4.2%, with 99% confidence level.

Panel Source: Majority of respondents are members of Agam Panel, enabling linkage to prior attitudes, media use, and political violence history.

Trust in institutions and figures
Scenario evaluations
Emotional sentiment
Political preferences






Support for Attack on Iran

70% of Israelis support the Israeli military strike on Iran

83% of Jewish respondents support it

Only **16% oppose** the operation

On the night between Thursday and Friday, Israel launched an attack against military targets in Iran. In response, Iran launched hundreds of ballistic missiles and cruise missiles against targets in the Israeli homeland. What is your position on the Israe






Support for Striking Nuclear Facilities

46% believe Israel should strike Iran's nuclear facilities even without U.S. support, while 34% think it should only strike with U.S. backing. 16% prefer a diplomatic solution.

Do you support Israel carrying out military strikes on Iran's nuclear facilities?






Dominant Sentiment: Hope and Pride Surpass Fear and Despair

The most dominant public sentiment is fear (35%), followed by pride (28%), hope (24%), and despair (13%). In total, 52% report positive dominant emotions, versus 48% who feel mostly fear or despair. There are significant differences between the feelings of Jewish and Arab citizens.








Effect of the Campaign on Social Cohesion

The vast majority of Israelis believe the campaign against Iran will increase national unity — a significant increase compared to the 40% who felt the same during the April 2024 Iranian attack.

International Relations and Civilian Impact

More than two-thirds of the public recognize the importance of a defense alliance with the U.S. 46% believe Israel should act even without allied defensive support. The public is divided on whether to continue the campaign at the cost of thousands of casualties on the home front.



Readiness of the Home Front for a Prolonged Campaign

Around 60% of Israelis believe the home front is moderately or highly prepared for a prolonged Iranian attack, compared to about 40% who think otherwise.

To what extent do you think the Israeli home front is prepared for a prolonged war against Iran?






Trust in Organizations Managing the Campaign

The Air Force earns the highest level of trust ("very high"), followed by the Mossad ("very high"), the emergency services ("high"), and the IDF ("high"). The government and the security cabinet receive the lowest levels of trust ("low").

How confident are you in the ability of each of the following parties to handle the campaign against Iran?






Trust in Officials Managing the Campaign

The head of the Mossad receives the highest level of trust, followed by the Air Force Commander and the Chief of Staff.

Members of the security cabinet receive the lowest trust.

The Prime Minister receives a moderately low score.






Dependency on the U.S. for Removing the Threat

Only a quarter of Israelis believe Israel can eliminate the Iranian threat without U.S. military assistance.

Do you think Israel can completely destroy the Iranian nuclear infrastructure and completely remove the military threat that Iran poses to Israel, without American military assistance?






Israel's Response to a U.S. Demand to End the Campaign

Most Israelis think that if the U.S. demands Israel stop its strike on Iran, Israel should agree.
About 30% believe Israel should continue attacking despite such a demand.

If the US insists that Israel end the attack against Iran in favor of reaching an agreement that will ensure that Iran will not be able to enrich nuclear weapons for military purposes, how should Israel respond?



- The US demand should be refused and Israel should continue attacking Iran until its nuclear infrastructure is destroyed

Goal of the Campaign

The public is split on the campaign's end goal: about half believe Israel should seek complete destruction of Iran's capabilities, while a similar share supports a diplomatic agreement to prevent Iran from obtaining offensive nuclear capabilities.

What should be the ultimate goal of Israel's action against Iran's nuclear program?




- Totally destroy Iran's nuclear infrastructure and military capabilities even at the cost of all-out war

Rise in Support for a Hostage Deal in Gaza

There has been a significant rise in Israeli support for a deal to release hostages in exchange for ending the Gaza campaign — 75% now support such a deal.
